

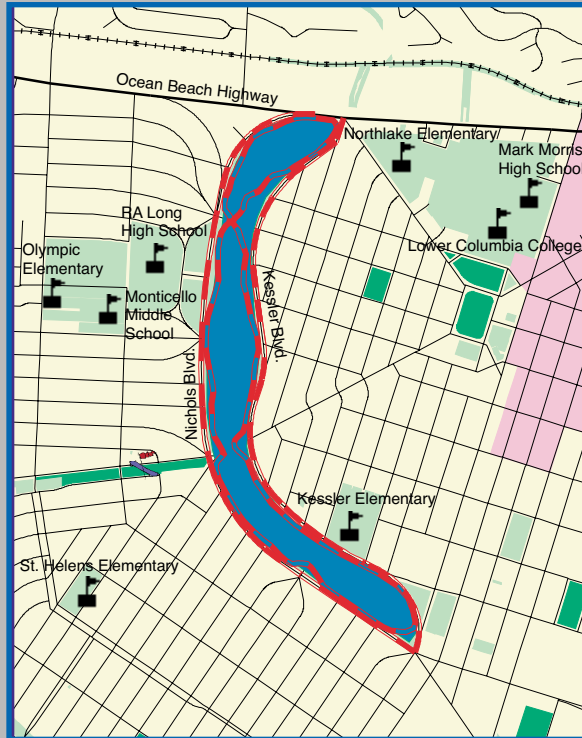
Trail maps

East Longview



Lake Sacajawea Park Trail

Length: 3.57 miles
Location: Stretches from Ocean Beach Highway at the N end to Oregon Way at the S end. Bordering streets running on the E and W sides of the lake are Nichols Blvd and Kessler Blvd.
Description/Access: A graveled path is located around the perimeter of the lake park which covers 60 acres and holds 119 species of trees. At the N end of the lake is a beautiful Chinese garden. Shorter paths can be taken through access to footbridges and road bridges located across the lake. Access to the path by vehicle can be at any point along the perimeter of the lake. Side street parking is permitted by the lake.



Third Avenue Trail

Length: 1 mile
Location: Intersection of Third Avenue behind Columbia Ford Dealership
Description/Access: The trail runs N parallel to Third Avenue along a wetland. The path continues behind the Seventh Avenue Park to Hudson Street. It continues along a ditch between 7th and 3rd Avenues, ending at Peardale Lane.

Safety Tips

Be visible

At dusk, dawn and/or night, wear reflectorized clothing for visibility. During the day, wear bright, light clothing.

Be careful

Always look both ways before crossing the street. When crossing, wait for a safe gap in traffic and make eye contact with the driver of any approaching vehicle.

Make sure drivers see you

Don't dart out or suddenly enter the street. If you are emerging from behind a parked car or other obstacle, slowly step out and make sure you are visible. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic.

Be alert

Be aware of all traffic, particularly vehicles making a "right on red".

Walk with a friend

Walking with someone is safer than walking on your own. Encourage a friend or family member to join you.

Pets and Exercise

Walking with your dog is a healthy thing to do. Both people and dogs benefit from exercise. Here are some important tips:

- Walk your dog on a secure leash
- Be sure to pick up after your pet
- During warm weather, carry water for your pet
- Identification is a must. Every pet should wear their license tag for identification and safety



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
