RE: **Cowlitz County Hepatitis B Outbreak**

The purpose of this advisory is information only. You do not need to take specific action.

The week of March 28, 2011, Cowlitz County Health Department identified a local outbreak of acute hepatitis B. The County has received reports of four individuals with acute hepatitis B in the last 4 weeks (versus three to five total in a typical year).

Age range is 20 – 42. The common risk factor is sharing drug paraphernalia, either needles or straws for snorting cocaine. Of note, three of the four cases had documentation of complete hepatitis B vaccine series.

For individuals with symptoms suggestive of hepatitis B, please arrange for liver function tests, hep B panel and hep D testing (coinfection rates up to 50% in urban IVDU). Report all positive Hepatitis results to the local health jurisdiction of the individual's county of residence.

Please also verify complete hepatitis B vaccination on individuals you encounter, with special attention to those at higher risk due to illicit drug use.
